

Last Month's Event



This Month's Meeting



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Here is a tip I'd learn a few months ago. You know how hard it is to see the white lettering on the light blue backing paper that all decals are printed on. Well go to your favorite store and buy a handy dandy Marks-A-Lot, black marker. Turn your decal over (back side of decal) and mark your area where the white is printed. This will soak in the paper, then you can see where the white is when you are cutting it out.

I took the box of the HO parts to the Division 5 meeting and put out a donation can next to it. All the parts where taken and we got \$12.75 in donations. I put the money in our donations jug. We actually got money out of the HO guys for the N-scale group! Matt

I now have a Life-Like SW9/1200 engine. Well, from first hand experience I can agree with the praise that has been given to this engine. I don't have a comparison to show against it, but as far as slow speed movement, I managed to get it to start at a speed where it took 1 minute to move half its own body length before speeding up slightly, able to drop the throttle a little so total body length of track being covered took almost 2 minutes. I am VERY impressed.

As far as Micro-Trains coupler conversion for the beast

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goes, I was NOT about to drill a hole through the walkways on the front or the rear of the engine. (According to the on the box specifications, the screw hole would be dead center of the walkways on the front and back of the engine to mount the couplers). I was happy to discover that by carefully snapping out the original coupler holder (pressing in between the space of the top step and the deck in front/ back will push the snap holder off its attachment point. This will allow the holder to fall/be pulled from the engine body) and removing the metal spring (a flat piece of metal) the pin used to hold the old coupler could hold the Micro-Trains 1015-1 RDA that I have through its screw hole. Attached, the small throat of the draft box pokes through the coupler hold on the engine with the rest of the draft box filling it to make a solid front. It actually looks guite nice to my eyes, though I have no clue how it compares to the prototype.
