# Learning (???) From Prototype

#### How do brushless motors work?

Here's my take on it, but I'm no expert. This is just my Texas logic and experience working together to arrive at an intelligent conclusion. Some of you DCC experts might be able to explain this more intelligently.

SMOKE makes all things electrical work! Remember the last time the smoke escaped from your power pack after you connected it backwards? Didn't it quit working? How about some of those expensive signal lights? I don't know what a resistor is and I didn't use one, but I expect it helps control the smoke, because when I hooked the signal light up to the 12 volt accessory poles it flashed real brightly and leaked out smoke and quit working.

Nearly the same thing happened to one of those Mars headlight chips Jim Hinds sold me! I took one out of an F unit and was going to put it into another one. I tested it on that ACC line after pulling it out and the smoke escaped out of one of those little round chips on the board and it never worked again. Makes me wonder if Jim is selling top quality products if the smoke can leak out so easily.

Remember when that Bachmann diesel blew smoke out and quit working? They have cheap wiring because they leak smoke more often than the Katos. I had the same thing happen to one of my motors controlling a turnout that was impossible to reach. It sprang a leak, all the smoke leaked out, and it quit working. And it's just out of reach.

Some electrical systems require greater quantities of smoke to

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operate properly; that's why the wires going to them are so big.

And what about your auto's engine? As the smoke increasingly leaks out the tailpipe, doesn't the performance of the engine decrease? Of course it does.

Ever see someone blow an engine while racing, letting all the smoke out at once? What a mess! Then they have to replace the motor. Right?

As with any controversial new theory, there are some aspects which require further investigation. For example, one would think that people who smoke would be much healthier from ingesting all that smoke. Perhaps smokers actually exhale more smoke than they inhale. Has anyone ever measured?

I recently took the opportunity to observe a group of young people smoking heavily at a rock concert. Evidently, they were replacing smoke they had previously lost. It seemed the more they smoked, and the longer they held the smoke in, the better they felt.

Hey, don't just take my word for it. Test this out on your layout. Turn the power pack on full power and place a metal object across both tracks until the smokes escapes out of the power pack. My bet is that it won't work after all the smoke has leaked out. I rest my case....
