





Thankfully, Matt K. found it and reached out to invite him to our October meeting. He has also participated at our displays at the Thompson Library and at the NETS show in Highland Hts. So if you happen to see a man with a white beard and baseball hat that would be Bob H.! Not to be confused with Bob G. who also wears a hat and has a white beard. Bob H. wears glasses as well, Bob G. might, but I haven't seen him do so. If you happen to meet new Bob be sure to say hello and welcome him to our group! Bob H. has also graciously written an introductory piece for those who may not have had the pleasure of meeting him. Please read so that you get a chance to know him a little better.



I'm the new Bob in the group, Bob H. I have been a model railroader for over 70 years, starting with S gauge American Flyer, my sister and Dad worked on the layout in our basement in Cleveland Heights.

The train was torn out in 1960 to make space for drawing boards since my sister (5 years older) was going to the Cleveland Institute of Art. I needed a drawing board as well since I was also interested in taking art classes at the Cleveland Museum of Art and I graduated from the CIA, class of 1970, with a major in Industrial Design and a minor in jewelry and metalsmithing.

While in elementary school I began a collection of toy soldiers which now includes just under 1,000 1/32 W. Britain metal toy soldiers. As a result I was interested in the American Civil War and started planning a Civil War layout in HO gauge. Sadly, the miniatures for that did not exist at that point in time. So, I became interested in modeling the logging and sawmills of Pennsylvania. That layout went along the 25 foot basement wall of our house in Wickliffe which we moved into in 1974. It had a sad ending, with never being completed and dismantled waterproofing when our basement in 2000.

By that time I had spent seventeen years working at Allen-Bradley and then went to Picker International where I began working in the M.R.I. division. Here I got to know a fellow employee who was in a group of wargamers. He invited me to come and try historical wargaming. Which became my main hobby.

I began modeling and gaming different historical periods combining my love for paper sculptures and constructing paper kits. 

November Meeting


